Since the beginning of our Charity project in 1997, we've been working together with OAALMAC, Arun Solat and his team. As reported earlier, in recent years there has been a shift from correctional surgery requests, to supplying more and more orthopaedic aids to needy patients in our care.







This keeps Prosthetist Mr. Solat and his hardworking team of Orthotic technicians pretty busy. Various types of appliances and walking aids are being manufactured with skill and expertise, fitted on patients, maintained, and repaired when necessary.

Arun Solat is technically well trained and holds a certified degree from USA. And just like Dr Desai of Shraddha Clinic, Mr Solat chose to work among his own people, offering his skills and services to the poor through his workshops in Mumbai.

We are very glad to be working together for the benefit of the Underprivileged and Disabled. By making OAALMAC available to the poor and needy, many patients benefit and receive valuable aids.

In the north-western part of Mumbai, near Dr Desai's residence, a major fire ripped through the slum area. It was caused due to a gas cylinder exploding in a kitchen. The fire spread instantly to the nearby hutments, which were made mostly out of wood and plastic! 25-30 more gas cylinders exploded, causing panic and havoc, with homes of the slum dwellers gutted to the ground. Picture-Log/Report:

1, 2+4) Vijay (26yr) suffers from a rare genetic bone disorder, called Osteogenesis Imperfecta. It is characterized by fragile bones that bend and break easily. He had been in treatment since 2013, when his family brought him to us. A series of multiple-stage surgeries, including limb-lengthening procedure to correct the difficult deformities were diagnosed. Thanks to the sponsorship/special grant by ONGC India, most surgeries could be carried out by Dr Desai and Vijay has 5 progressed much since then. His legs are straight, mobility has improved and he is now operating a kiosk on his own!



1+3) Shreya, the daughter of a poor cobbler, disabled due to Cerebral Palsy, used to limp around on two crutches. After using the calliper for three years, she walks comfortably without it.

5+6) 11yr old Shriraj also suffers from crippled legs due to Cerebral Palsy. His parents, Eknath and Ekta, brought him to us, and were very thankful to get a splinter from hip on down with shoes for him. Shriraj had to be previously helped with every step he took. Now, the boy is very upbeat in spirit and self-esteem, due to much increase in mo-bility, going around his home on his own!

7+8) Sairaj (4yr) had to undergo a difficult surgery in order to correct deformity in his leg. The little boy wore the needed fixator patiently for months. A special calliper was made by OAAMLAC, which helped Sairaj to stand comfortably and begin moving around.

It has helped to create a good bond with all the people around including our patients residing in these slums.

It also serves as a good platform to train new volunteers, giving individuals a chance to serve those in need. In a recent event, Rishita and Usha of Bandu's family, also participated. Rishita surveved a slum area, invited needy families, and kept protocol of distribution, with the help of Vinay and her mother, Usha (pic3).

Vinay, a bright student of IIT-Institute Mumbai, loves caring for the needy, takes keen interest in social work and joins us for events regularly. Two old-time helpers, Nilratan and Mahendra (pic5), are also very charitable and have over the years given CFWF valuable assistance in various ways. During these gatherings, we take time to consult, follow-up, and discuss treatment needs of the patients present (pic4).











Progress-Report; New Centre for CFWF-Project & Team being

For many years, Child & Family Welfare Foundation team, wished to have a centre of their own, with enough space to house all team members and project activities under one roof. It could also serve as a facility for Rehab of children and patients in our project, which helps Differently Able and the Underprivileged.

After years of research for our future home and base for CFWF-Project, we were able to take the initial step in 2013, by acquiring a plot in Nashik area and began construction plans for a new centre. The task was daunting, not to mention, uprooting from Mumbai after having settled there for nearly 30 years. However, we felt strongly that God was leading us in this direction. As we stepped out, the supply of the huge amount of funds required for construction, started to pour in amazingly. By God's kindness, we may be able to complete the centre by early 2018. Construction is carried out very well by our dear friend and builder, Sandip.

It's been an exciting journey with many challenges, especially, our move in 2016 from cosmopolitan, affluent Mumbai to a remote rural surrounding, residing in a temporary, small housing, until our centre is ready. While we are patiently waiting, we keep ourselves busy carrying out the project activities, also help with planning and coordination at the site, hoping to receive quickly the remaining funds needed, in order to complete this important project in the near future.
